**Simple Past Tense** 

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Target students: Lower intermediate (Senior primary)

Corpus used: COCA (https://www.english-corpora.org/coca/)

Lesson duration: 120 mins

Topic: Diaries

**Lesson objectives:** 

By the end of the lesson, the students will be able to:

1. Identify the past-tense form;

2. Demonstrate awareness of the spelling rules of past tense verbs;

Use COCA to search for the past-tense forms and collaborate with teammates to 3.

solve language problems;

4. Use past tense verbs to write a diary.

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### **Step 1: Video watching**

1. Ask students to watch a video on what the class did yesterday and then answer the following questions.

What did you do? We went to the park. - Easy Dialogue

- (a) What did the dog do yesterday?
- (b) What did Sally do yesterday?
- (c) What did Mike do yesterday?
- (d) What did the teacher do yesterday?
- 2. Ask students to circle the past tense verbs in the dialogue.

Good morning, Sally. How are you?

I'm great. What did you do yesterday?

We went to the park.

What did you do in the park?

We flew kites. His kites flew high.

Wow! You're good.

What did you do yesterday, Sally?

I read books.

Let's go to the classroom.

What did you do yesterday?

I watched a science movie.

What did you do yesterday, Mike?

I made bulgogi with my dad.

How was it?

It was very delicious. We had a bulgogi party.

I made cookies yesterday. I brought cookies for you.

Thanks! Mm, delicious!


### **Step 2: Introduction of the structure of a diary entry**

- 1. Ask students to read the following diary. In groups, they have to find out the features of a diary (e.g. the format, date, weather, past tense forms, etc.)
- 2. Ask students to circle the past tense verbs in the diary and explain why the past tense is used.

# 3 August 2019 (Saturday) It was Uncle Fred's wedding today. Our family went to his wedding party. All of us felt great. I found a missing ring on the floor of the church. It belonged to a woman in a floral dress. I picked up the ring and returned it to her. She was very happy to get her ring back. She thanked me and said I was a very honest

### Step 3: Discovery of the verb form of past simple.

- 1. Ask students to predict the past-tense form of the given verbs;
- 2. Show students how to search for different verb forms on COCA; Instructions:
  - Website of COCA: <a href="https://www.english-corpora.org/coca/">https://www.english-corpora.org/coca/</a>
  - Type in the target word under 'List' [work], and choose 'verb.ALL' in the part of speech



 All the verb forms of 'work' are shown. Ask students to tell which is the past tense form.

	CONTEXT ALL FORMS (SAMPLE): 100 200 500

Note: 'worked' is both the past tense form and the past participle of 'work'.

3. In groups, students do hands-on search on COCA and fill in the table. Group 1 works on Table 1, Group 2 on Table 2, and Group 3 on Table 3.
